
DO YOU ENJOY FISHING? YOU NEED TO CHECK OUT THIS CONTEST



Haven 4H club has been busy with presentations. The 4H club meets monthly and each club meeting members can sign up to do a talk or demonstration for the club. Our members have been busy giving presentations and sharing information with our club. In November Aubree McCurry gave a presentation on cattle identification, such as ear tags, different types of branding and ear tattoos. Molly McCurry showed the club how to show a beef project and what materials you would need, like a halter, different types of show combs and other items. The December meeting Connor Blubaugh, Zach Blubaugh and Bayleigh Minnis gave a talk on parliamentary procedure, why it is important and what the rules are, and led the club in making a snack mix using parliamentary procedure, their demonstration was titled Motion Potion. In the January meeting BrieAnn Brawner and Braydon Blubaugh did a demonstration on making chocolate chip cookies and shared the end product with the club, Noah Miller taught the club how to candle eggs to check for the development of a chick. Clara Miller and Amelia Scott gave a demonstration on rabbit showmanship for the club to learn more about the rabbit project. February's meeting Amara Dugnolle demonstrated baking cupcakes and shared the end product with the club. Eliya Dugnolle gave a talk and demonstration on using chalk to make art, and how to save it to hang up. Spencer Dugnolle helped by creating her own artwork following the instructions of Eliya both making a sunflower chalk art piece. In the April meeting Kyler Geffert gave a talk on Beef EPG's expected progeny difference and the genetics of cattle. Kayden Geffert gave a demonstration on getting cattle ring ready. 4 friends, 4-H, 8 years of growing Each year Reno County 4H has an activity day called 4H days. This is where 4H members can come and

do demonstrations, informative talks, play musical pieces, or show their knowledge of parliamentary procedure and Roberts Rules of Order. The Parliamentary Procedure competition has been a fun activity for a group of Haven 4H-er's, Connor Blubaugh- Sophomore, Braydon Blubaugh-Freshman, Kyler Geffert-Freshman, and Noah Miller Freshman started as a junior team at the ages of 8 and 9. This year on April 9, marked their 8th year of competing together as a team for this event. This team has taken this activity and expressed its importance to club members and help each year so other teams sign up to participate too, for the past 8 years Haven has had 3 or more teams register each year. Haven Club parents have stated they enjoy watching these senior leaders practice with, teach and support younger members. One parent noted how much the younger members enjoyed practicing with them, and the snacks they brought to the practice. Each team consists of 4 members who are in the role of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer and must run a meeting with certain requirements, such as opening a meeting, approving previous minutes, treasurer's report, having old and new business, tabling motions, rising to a point of order, and many other actions. The requirements are more as you move from Junior to intermediate to the senior division. The Junior and Intermediate teams can pick your position before going into a meeting, but the senior division must draw their positions when they arrive before the judge, so they do not know who will be in what role until they start the meeting. Parents watching the competition Saturday noted how easy this team made it look and how comfortable they were conducting a business meeting like professionals. The moms were able to show pictures from the first year and it is fun to compare those to the current year and see how these 4H members have grown physically as well as their ability to use parliamentary procedure, and be a leaders to younger members. Donna Phillips, Reno County 4H Project Assistant has been a part of these young men's 4H journey from day one, she said "To watch these 4 grow into such amazing young men that could walk into any meeting and run it better than most adults has been an honor". We look forward to seeing what these young men can do for their club, community, country and world as they continue on their journey's.

YQCA Requirement for State Shows

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national, multi-species youth livestock quality assurance program that focuses on food safety, animal well-being, and life skill development, through age-appropriate educational curriculum for youth 7-21 years of age. This program is an annual certification that grows with a young person, so the learning modules are different every year. ALL exhibitors are required to be YQCA certified in order to participate in the 2022 Kansas State Fair Grand Drive and/or Kansas Junior Livestock Show (KJLS). This includes youth who will be showing market animals, commercial breeding females, and/or registered purebred breeding females. Families should contact their local extension office to see what options are available in their local area. Everyone planning to state nominate animals are highly encouraged to complete the training as soon as possible.

The YQCA program recently transitioned to a new platform, so families will need to create an account, using the new website: https://yqcaprogram.org/. The program is no longer connected to 4HOnline.

Those experiencing technical difficulties should contact the help desk: help@yqcaprogram.org. Additionally, families need to double check each child is being registered correctly, using their age as of 1/1/2022. Occasionally, the system uses the parent's name as the default, so families need to make sure the correct child is selected before submitting their payment and completing the registration process.

The option is now available for 7-year-olds to register and obtain certification through the YQCA program. They must participate in an instructor-led class with a parent or guardian. Those who need a web-based option for a 7-year-old exhibitor should contact their local extension office. The YQCA requirement to include 7-year-old KJLS exhibitors went into effect in 2021.

Families will be prompted to upload their YQCA certificates into the online system while submitting their state livestock nominations. The system will only ask once, so families need to be prepared to upload it upon entering their first animal. More information may be found on the K-State Youth Livestock website (www.YouthLivestock.ksu.edu) under Youth Livestock Quality Assurance, by contacting the local extension office, or via Lexie Hayes at adhayes@ksu.edu or 785-532-1264.
